He tells us in Luke 22, "This is my body, which is given for you." And in Matthew 26, "This is my blood, of the new covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." Jesus recognizes that the body and blood He shares with His disciples at the Last Supper is the very same body and blood that He will sacrifice on the cross.


Jesus gave us His last will and testament on Holy Thursday and He used His words literally. This was the final time spent with His disciples and He wanted to make it clear that what He was saying to them was accurate, was taken seriously, and that it would be carried out to His people as such.

Many Christians who do not believe in the real presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist believe that this grace of transforming the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Jesus is just a symbol. However, in John's gospel, Jesus emphatically repeats Himself six times in six verses in order to articulate the literal meaning of this grace. In fact, many disciples quit following Jesus because of this teaching and they left Him without asking Jesus to explain what He meant. This tells us that they understood perfectly what Jesus was saying and that He meant precisely

what He said. If you read the gospel of St. John, you will see that many unbelieving disciples said "This is a hard saying, who can listen to it?" and many unbelieving Jews said "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Jesus does not mix words here nor does He call back any of the disciples after they leave Him. Even His chosen twelve were taken back by His words so much so that Jesus asks them "Will you also go away?" But Peter responds by saying "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

Jesus speaks about the real presence of the Eucharist and discusses the faith needed to accept difficult teachings about the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist in St. John's gospel. If we have true faith and believe that God can do all things, then we can understand that Jesus meant what He said at the Last Supper. Jesus changed water in wine at the Wedding Feast of Cana; He fed 5000 people with five loaves of bread and two fish with 12 baskets filled with leftovers; He calmed the storm at sea and questioned Peter's faith.

Jesus wants to make us realize that the Body and Blood that we receive is the nourishment and promise of eternal life. Jesus gives us Himself once again so that we may receive Him in His humanity and His divinity. He gives us Himself so that we may become, for a short time, living tabernacles of the living God. As we approach the altar today along with these blessed children, let us understand who we are receiving with faith and with love. Let us realize that this grace of the Eucharist unites us to Jesus Christ. "Holy Communion is the shortest and safest way to heaven." Says Pope St. Pius X. Jesus becomes our spiritual food, the cure for our souls and the fulfillment of everlasting life.



RUN TO OUR LADY OF LEBANON

In 1908, the Patriarch of the Maronite Catholic Church pronounced Virgin Mary as the Queen of Lebanon, and what symbol is more fitting for this pronouncement than the 13-ton statue of the Virgin Mary named Our Lady of Lebanon in Harissa.

Also known as Notre Dame du Liban, Our Lady of Lebanon is the primary Marian shrine and pilgrimage site in the country. It is made of bronze but painted white and was constructed by the French in 1907. It stands majestically on Harissa in Jounieh, 16 km to the north of Beirut, Lebanon's capital. The mountain was named Harissa after the small village that is found on its peak.

Our Lady stands with arms outstretched and head bowed low looking over the bay, the hill villages and the city below. Seafarers are welcomed by her as they enter the picturesque Bay of Jounieh.

Beside the much revered statue is the concrete and glass cathedral of the Maronite Catholic Church. The Maronite Christians are Eastern Catholics who follow the canonical, spiritual and liturgical teachings of Saint Maron. They are not very different from Roman Catholics since Maronites revere the Sacraments, Rome and the Pope just the same. The statue's base is a small chapel where

pilgrims and devotees converge to pray.

On May 10, 1997, Pope John Paul II made an official papal visit to Lebanon to visit Notre Dame du Liban. It was a significant visit since it marked the first official visit of a Roman Catholic pontiff to the Middle East. A year later, Rome chose Our Lady of Lebanon as the official shrine for the celebration of the World Day of the Sick that was to take place on February 11, 1999. The Pope encouraged the Lebanese to pray to their patron to watch over the plight of suffering people all over the world as she has watched over the suffering Lebanese people. More recently on January 28, 2007, Pope Benedict XVI prayed to Our Lady of Lebanon for peace in Lebanon and Gaza.
