



# FEAST OF OUR LADY OF THE HARVEST

In the Maronite Church there are three unique feasts that celebrate Mary, they are Our Lady of the Seeds, Our Lady of the Harvest and Our Lady of the Grapes. The Syriac Churches developed the earliest Marian theology, focusing on typology, symbolism, creation and the Incarnation. There are textual records of these feasts from the fifth and sixth centuries in the Antiochene Church, but tradition maintains their origins go back to late apostolic times. The feasts are celebrated on the following dates: 15 January – Our Lady of the Seeds 15 May – Our Lady of the Harvest

15 August – Our Lady of the Grapes

It is possible that these feasts grew out of earlier agricultural feasts and they are linked with the natural seasons of the Earth. In Syriac thought, creation does not only contain symbols of God, rather in it, everything has been placed to reveal God in his hiddenness.

There is a connection between these feasts and the Mystery of the Eucharist. The three feasts yield the ingredients for bread and wine and link the Virgin Mary to the Eucharist. They reveal God's divine plan.

Their symbolism is best captured in the celebration of Maronite

### TABLE TALK: 1 Peter 2:1-25

"Your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Heavenly Father." (Mt 5:16)

St. Peter's letter tells us that we as Catholics cannot remain as we are. There are things we must rid ourselves of in order to be followers of Christ.

One must rid themselves of deceit by not deceiving others in order to achieve one's own needs---those whose motives are never pure. We must turn our wickedness, our hatred of others into just and good deeds; to love one another. We must turn away from the acts of the Pharisees and scribes---that of hypocrisy and dishonesty. We must turn away from envy, jealousy, and resentment so that our hearts are at peace and we rejoice with others. We must turn away from slander---of gossip and destruction of others. All of these vices lead to destruction of the human heart. They carry with them everything that keeps us away from God and His promise to us of eternal life.

St. Peter tells us that in order to do this we must be like infants who long for "spiritual milk." Jesus tells us that unless we are childlike, we cannot enter into the kingdom It is through this of heaven. spiritual milk that Christians are nourished with the Word of God by which we grow until we reach salvation. We must begin with the basics just as a child begins with the basics. We are also chosen by God to be His living stones. By becoming living stones in the sight of God, we strive to build a community of faith. A stone is useless when it sits by itself; however, if we all become a living stone in the building of our community, our foundation is strong and secure and we are protected by the community and by God.

Now what does St. Peter mean when he tells us that we are a "chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation?" Just as the Gentiles became a "chosen race" by accepting Jesus Christ as their Savior, by our baptism, we have also become a chosen race through our initiation into the Body of Christ---His Church. And by our baptism each and every one of us are part of this royal priesthood. This is not a new idea that came to fruition during Vatican II; rather, it

is confirmed and explained in the encyclical *Lumen Gentium* which states that "those who are baptized participate in the priesthood of Christ. Christ has formed the priestly baptized into a community." You exercise this "royal priesthood" by your active participation in the liturgy; by your celebration and reception of the sacraments; and by prayer and living with justice and love. Finally, we are a Holy Nation that is marked with God's hand as He claims us as His own. Just as God claimed the people of Israel as His own by leading them out of Egypt, so does Jesus claim us as His own by leading us out of darkness and into the light of sin by His death on a cross. Once you were "no people" but now you are God's people; you "had not received mercy" but now you have received mercy. We receive mercy from God in order to give mercy back to others. The question is how do we get there? Brothers and Sisters, we are already there. We have been given this gift through our baptism, our participation, and our love for Jesus Christ. What we must now do is implement what God has given us into our daily lives. This is difficult, but not impossible! If we truly understand our initiation into the "royal priesthood", then we must always remember our hope for an everlasting kingdom by offering ourselves as a sacrifice, our cross as a sacrifice to God and to lead blameless and holy lives. Bishop Gerald Barbarito of Palm Beach once said "we are not called to be perfect; we are called to be Holy." Perfection lies only in God. If we were able to be perfect, there would be no need for Jesus' sacrifice on a cross. What is needed on our behalf is to be holy and this is what we are called to do.
