FOOD FOR THOUGHT

The Lord's Prayer

"This is how you are to pray: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread; and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors; and do not subject us to the final test, but deliver us from the evil one. If you forgive others their transgressions, your heavenly Father will forgive you. But if you do not forgive others, neither will your Father forgive your transgressions."

(Matthew 6:9-15 NAB)

Each week when we gather in this Church, we recite this prayer that Jesus taught us. And sometimes we may recite this prayer from memory and never give these words their due meaning. As we begin our Lenten journey, I thought this would be a great opportunity to reflect on this prayer and enlighten our hearts with what these words are asking of us; these words that Jesus gave us to pray.

This prayer should fill us with hope and consolation. St. Augustine said that "the Lord's Prayer is so perfect that it sums up in a few words everything man needs to ask God for." In the beginning of this prayer, we are acknowledging God as our Father and that His name be Holy. And by this acknowledgment God is sanctified because His creation sees Him as our Father who is the creator of all. We also acknowledge that the kingdom that Jesus promised us

as our final destination, will be coming when our journey on this earth is over. This realization of the Kingdom of God helps us share in God's inner life. This realization makes us strive for goodness and holiness so that we may share in the eternal life that Jesus

promised us. And finally, in the beginning of this prayer we are saying that we will surrender to the will of God regardless of our wants and needs. We literally place our trust and our life in God's loving hands, unconditionally and unequivocally.

By asking God to give us our daily bread, we are petitioning Him to give us only what we need. As we become older and wiser, we realize that the material things that were once important are no longer the center of our lives. We may enjoy the fruits of our hard work; however, we become more aware that our needs are much different than our wants. The Fathers of the Church interpret "daily bread" not only as material food needed to survive. The bread of life, the Eucharist, is what nourishes our bodies and souls and helps us receive the graces that are bestowed upon us through this sacrament. Let us receive so that we may live---this is the Blessed Eucharist and this is what we are petitioning to God.


Forgiveness of our debts is the reason our Lord came to this world. What a gift of unconditional love Jesus gave us. However, he warns us that just as He forgives us our sins, we also must forgive others.

We cannot ask God to do something for us if we are not willing to do the same for others. God makes this very clear throughout the Old and New Testament---referring to man's sinful condition. This should not be a surprise to any of us. The gospel tells us "Those who are without sin cast the first stone." Why does Jesus give us these words? The answer is very simple---it is a reminder that no one would be able to

condemn anyone because even the righteous are sinners. This prayer implies that our unwillingness to forgive others dictates God's unwillingness to forgive us.

Temptation is the work of evil and we are surrounded by temptation continuously. This is the real truth of the human life. No matter how much we try to avoid temptation, it is always lurking around the corner trying to find its way into our lives. Once we understand that we are incapable of combating this certainty of temptation alone, through prayer and especially the Lord's Prayer, we rely on His help to make us stronger against the evils of this world. God asks us to rely on Him, trust in Him, and believe in Him, and by doing so we will never lose hope. Brothers and sisters, no one on this earth is perfect. God knows that we have our defects. That is why He asks us not for perfection but for holiness. That is why God loves all of His creation, defects and all. And that is why he forgives us, sins and all. However, we are also called to love and forgive others just as God loves and forgives us. If we wait to love others who haven't sinned against us or behaved badly against us, we will never be able to love. St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians tells us:

If I speak in human and angelic tongues but do not have love, I am a resounding gong or a clashing cymbal. And if I have the gift of prophecy and comprehend all mysteries and all knowledge; if I have all faith so as to move mountains but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away everything I own, and if I hand my body over so that I may boast but do not have love, I gain nothing. Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, [love] is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails. **So, faith, hope, love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love.** It is only through love that we are able to forgive others who have hurt us. Brothers and sisters, as we begin our journey in this Season of Lent, let us

pray the Lord's Prayer with the understanding of the meaning of these words. Let us say this prayer with conviction and ask God's help to fulfill the commands of His prayer. May we find in our hearts the strength to love and forgive those who have offended us just as the Father loves and forgives us when we offend Him. In the words of St. Pius V, "In loving our enemies there shines forth in us some likeness to God our Father, who, by the death of His Son, ransomed from everlasting perdition and reconciled himself the human race, which before was most unfriendly and hostile to him." May the Lord's Prayer comfort you with hope and consolation and may it bring you peace until we reach our final destination in the Kingdom of God.
