

THIRD SUNDAY OF THE HOLY CROSS

CALLED TO BE HOLY

Last week we began our journey to holiness by taking time for ourselves to pray to Jesus; to thank Him for His love and sacrifice to us. This week we will begin with growing in virtues that leads us to holiness. The first of these virtues is faith. What is faith? What does it mean to have faith?

In the Epistle to the Hebrews from St. Paul, we are told that "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." How do we obtain this faith that says it is the assurance of things hoped for and the conviction of things not seen? Catholicism has been given to us from God through faith and through revelation. Much of our faith has been revealed to us from God by sending His Only Begotten Son to us in His human nature. Jesus Christ revealed to us who God the Father is and He also revealed to us the precepts and teachings so that we may be His followers. This was achieved through His ministry which was passed on to the apostles. It was through his suffering, his death, and His resurrection that we have been assured of this Truth. Most of our belief in God has been revealed.

Now what about faith? It is through what has been revealed to us by Jesus Christ that we are able to obtain the faith we need to understand those things that cannot be explained because of our human limitations. "Faith, of course, has as its object, not propositions and doctrines directly, but a person, namely Jesus the Christ. We believe in Him, and thence flows our belief in what He and His Church have taught." (Cardinal Timothy Dolan)


An example of faith would be that of children. As Cardinal Dolan has beautifully exemplified, the faith that children have in their parents as infants or older is not rational but spontaneous and natural, part of their being. When they cry, you will come; when they are scared, you will hold them; when they are hungry, you will feed them; when they are lonely, you will hold them. In short, faith is part of our being and it is a grace that is given to us freely from God if we allow it to penetrate our lives. Most people who have faith really don't think about it on a daily basis. This usually happens when life is going well, the family is healthy, the children are doing well in school, and life just seems to be going well. But the minute something tragic happens or life becomes so overwhelming for us, we fall back on our faith with much passion and much conviction. Sometimes this faith is questioned: sometimes we may ask ourselves do we really have faith if we are thinking this way or that way? Do we really have faith when we question God where He was or why we may feel abandoned?

Thomas Merton, a Trappist Monk, at probably a very trying moment in his life wrote the following:

"My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know where it will end. Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think that I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you. And I hope I have that desire in all I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire. And I know that if I do this you will lead me by the right road though I may know nothing about it. Therefore, I will trust you always though I may seem to be lost in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face the perils alone." With faith we are people of prayer; people who rely on the grace of God in times of trials and tribulations; people who are passionate and kind to others; people who have peace and joy. St. Augustine had said "when our faith sleeps, we are in danger." That is why we need prayer, we need the sacraments, we need sacred scriptures, and we need Jesus Christ.

FEAST OF SAINT THERESE OF LISIEUX



On October 1, Catholics around the world honor the life of St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus, or St. Thérèse of Lisieux on her feast day. St. Thérèse was born January 2, 1873, in Alençon, France to pious parents, both of whom are scheduled to be canonized in October 2016. Her mother died when she was four, leaving her father and elder sisters to raise her.

On Christmas Day 1886 St. Thérèse had a profound experience of intimate union with God, which she described as a "complete conversion." Almost a year later, in a papal audience during a pilgrimage to Rome, in 1887, she asked for and obtained permission from Pope Leo XIII to enter the Carmelite Monastery at the young age of 15.

On entering, she devoted herself to living a life of holiness, doing all things with love and childlike trust in God. She struggled with life in the convent but decided to make an effort to be charitable to all, especially those she didn't like. She performed little acts of charity always, and little sacrifices not caring how unimportant thev seemed. These acts helped her come to a deeper understanding of her vocation. She wrote in her autobiography that she had always dreamed of being a missionary, an Apostle, a martyr - yet she was a nun in a quiet cloister in France. How could she fulfill these longings?

"Charity gave me the key to my vocation. I understood that the Church had a Heart and that this Heart was burning with love. I knew that one love drove the members of the Church to action, that if this love were extinguished, the apostles would have proclaimed the Gospel no longer, the martyrs would have shed their blood no more. I understood that Love comprised all vocations, that Love was everything, that it embraced all times and places...in a word, that it was eternal! Then in the excess of my delirious joy, I cried out: O Jesus, my Love...my vocation, at last I have found it... My vocation is Love!" Thérèse offered herself as a sacrificial victim to the merciful Love of God on June 9, 1895, the feast of the Most Holy Trinity and the following year, on the night between Holy Thursday and Good Friday, she noticed the first symptoms of Tuberculosis, the illness which would lead to her death.

Thérèse recognized in her illness the mysterious visitation of the divine Spouse and welcomed the suffering as an answer to her offering the previous year. She also began to undergo a terrible trial of faith which lasted until her death a year and a half later. "Her last words, 'My God, I love you,' are the seal of her life," said Pope John Paul II. Since her death, millions have been inspired by her 'little way' of loving God and neighbor. Many miracles have been attributed to her intercession. She had predicted during her earthly life that "My Heaven will be spent doing good on Earth."

Saint Thérèse was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church by Pope John Paul II in 1997 - 100 years after her death at the age of 24. She is only the third woman to be so proclaimed, after Saint Catherine of Siena and Saint Teresa of Avila.

St. Thérèse wrote once, 'You know well enough that Our Lord does not look so much at the greatness of our actions, nor even at their difficulty, but at the love with which we do them."
